San Mateo High School Day of Remembrance

On Saturday, March 2, 2019 San Mateo High School (SMHS) and the College of San Mateo (CSM) Ethnic Studies and History Department presented a touching and educational Day of Remembrance (DoR) program.

As guests entered this event, the SMHS Jazz Band set the scene playing Big Band melodies from the forties. Lewis Kawahara CSM Professor and SMHS Class of 1965 member opened the program. Lewis had a leadership role in the development of this event in collaboration with SMHS faculty members and alumni.

DoR events commemorate Executive Order 9066 signed by President Roosevelt on February 19, 1942 that resulted in the incarceration of all persons of Japanese ancestry. San Mateo County Japanese Americans were initially taken to Tanforan Racetrack in San Bruno, including 33 SMHS students. On June 16, 1942 the

SMHS Principal, a group of teachers which included the Band Teacher, some San Mateo residents, eight SMHS band members

and a few from Burlingame High School (BHS) went to Tanforan Racetrack to hold a Commencement Ceremony. The combined band played the national anthem, SMHS Senior Yoneo Kawakita led the "Pledge of Allegiance," and six seniors from SMHS and two from BHS received their diplomas.

This DoR event was held to acknowledge and thank all those who were kind and compassionate towards their Japanese-American class members and friends by being brave enough to make that trip to hold a Commencement Ceremony.

The keynote speaker for the DoR, Mr. Bill Tsukida, SMHS Class of 1960 member and retired SMHS Social Studies teacher shared his story of being born in a concentration camp and how the incarceration profoundly affected his family and life.

Many SMHS graduates were in attendance and part of this event. It was an honor to see Mr. Yoneo Kawakita, SMHS Class of 1942, at this gathering with his family. Mr. Kawakita has been an activist in past years as part of the "History Committee" who published a comprehensive book detailing the history of Japanese Americans in San Mateo County titled <u>Building A Community</u> and by educating many people when sharing his story in classrooms and at other educational events.

After the formal program ended, guests were invited to stay and engage with several local high school students who attend CSM to discuss their story boards that explain the history that surrounds the abrogation of civil rights and the specific history of the incarnation of persons of Japanese a ancestry during World War II.

The world traveling Minidoka Swing Band (MSB) performs in the Pacific Northwest on a regular basis as a remembrance of WWII Japanese American Incarceration. They also did a four city 2015 tour in Japan, educating Japanese citizens about what Japanese Americans from the West coast endured during WWII and giving workshops.

The Minidoka Swing Band tells the story of WWII's Japanese American Incarceration using the Big Band music of the era, actual home-videos taken from inside the camps, and narration by actual survivors!

MSB uses original poetry by former Oregon Poet Laureate (2006-2010) Lawson Inada as well as personal stories by jazz musicians Larry Nobori and Nola Sugai Bogle (all three of whom are former Incarcerees) and MSB band members whose parents and families were incarcerated.

The Minidoka Swing Band will have three performances as part of the **National JACL's Education fund-** raiser.
